B2 ► With-Woman Care in a Birth Center—Jennifer Gallardo

Jennifer had a birth center in Guatemala for five years. When she moved to Portland, Oregon, she started another birth center. Learn how she did it. Learn about the care they give at analyzing and some unique call schedules that prevent midwife burnout. With-woman care extends to midwives in this practice as well.

B3 ► Technology as a Threat to the Normal Birth Process

—Marsden Wagner

Marsden will explore the reasons for and the negative consequences of the inappropriate or excessive application of technology—drugs as well as instruments, machinery and surgery—in birth. He will also explore the continuing search for new and profitable uses of technology in birth that take a society down a dangerous path. Scientific research is as important as clinical experience in today’s world. Learn about your role in the protection of pregnant and birthing women and how current research actually supports the use of less intervention at the very time that intervention is increasing in all aspects of birth. Discover what you can do in your own sphere of influence to establish the appropriate and careful use of technology.

B4 ► Prolonged Labor—Gail Hart

Long labors may be associated with complications ranging from social or emotional issues to physical problems. You’ll learn different reasons for prolonged labor and protracted labors, as well as methods for helping women move along in labors. How do we get a long labor to progress? Compare the midwifery model with the medical model and share techniques for resolving problems at home or in the hospital.

C1 ► Waterbirth Practice, Practicalities and New Discoveries

Cornelia will explore the many benefits and ways of using water in birth and will discuss its unique properties—psychological as well as physical. She will address concerns about water labor and waterbirth and its potential risks. She will report on clinical findings and current research and models from various places around the world, as well as share with us their hands-on experience with this timely subject.

C2 ► Practical Midwifery Techniques from Mexico

—Naolí Vinaver

It is fascinating to observe cultural traditions and their impact on pregnancy and birth. Naolí will discuss nutritional aspects, positioning, remedies, techniques and customs from Mexico. She will discuss the importance of healing touch, Mexican style, as a preventative tool and safe remedy for the pregnant body. You will learn how to turn malpresentation including posterior using a rebozo. The rebozo is a very useful tool in all parts of the childbearing cycle. Come learn how to use it.

C3 ► Breeches and Twins—Michel Odent

Learn the art and science of breech birth. Learn what factors may lead to breech presentation and when external version is contraindicated. The mechanism of normal breech birth, as well as the mechanism of a stuck breech and techniques for handling both will also be discussed. Michel has vast experience with twin deliveries. He will discuss strategies for safe birth, including positioning, time of delivery, premature delivery and avoiding postpartum hemorrhage.

C4 ► Tear Prevention and Alternatives to Suturing—Anne Frye

What happens if you leave a second-degree tear unstitched? Learn about the technique of using super glue instead of stitches. Scientific analysis and updates on this subject will be covered. Learn ways to facilitate healing with herbal baths and poultices and how to prevent tearing in the first place.

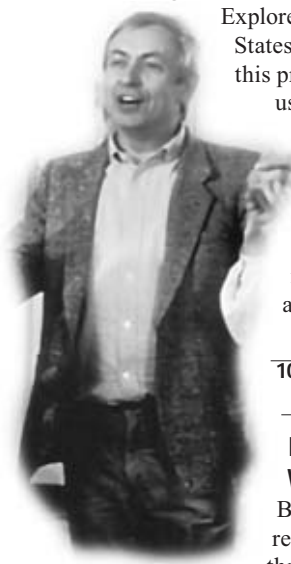

She is author of *Birth as an American Rite of Passage* (1992), co-author of *From Doctor to Healer: The Transformative Journey* (1998), and co-editor of *Childbirth and Authoritative Knowledge: Cross-Cultural Perspectives* (1997), *Intuition: the Inside Story* (1997) and *Cyborg Babies: From Techno-Sex to Techno-Tots* (1998). She is currently studying the politics and knowledge systems of what she calls "postmodern midwifery."

Patricia Edmonds received her initial training from Northwestern School of Practical Midwifery, in Portland, Oregon in 1976. She is one of the founding mothers of the Oregon Midwifery Council and has been the editor of *Birthing* for 15 years. Her two children were both born at home. She is retired after 26 years as a midwife, turning her attention to teaching.

Cornelia Enning has been a licensed midwife since 1972. She received a BE in 1972 at University Berlin. She has been doing homebirths/waterbirths since 1975 and is the founder of German Parents Association "Waterbabies." She is the author of the quarterly *Wasserbaby Post News* and the author of several books about waterbirth at home and in hospitals. She is the Head of the German Federation of Aquapaedagogik and is a teacher for parents with water training for newborns. She is the mother of two adult children.

Anne Frye resides in Portland, Oregon where she devotes her full-time attention to writing and publishing textbooks for the midwifery community, among them *Understanding Diagnostic Tests in the Childbearing Year*, now in its 6th edition, *Healing Passage, A Midwife's Guide to the Care and Repair of the Tissues Involved in Birth*, in its 5th edition, *Quick Reference Cards for Newborns With Problems*, the *Suturing Techniques for Midwives* video, *Holistic Midwifery, A Comprehensive Textbook for Midwives in Homebirth Practice, Vol. I: Care During Pregnancy and Holistic Midwifery, Vol. II* (in progress), covering the care of the mother and baby during labor. She holds an independent study B. A. degree in Holistic Midwifery and has been a midwife for 23 years.

Jennifer Gallardo, CPM, LDM, is a midwife and the founder and director of the Andaluz Waterbirth Center in Portland, Oregon. She founded the original Andaluz Waterbirth Center in Guatemala in 1995. She was inspired to promote waterbirth as a result of her own experience with hospital birth. Jennifer trained as a midwife in Guatemala City, as well as through the Seattle Midwifery School Challenge and the North American Registry of Midwives exam. She currently lives in Oregon with her husband, Fernando, and their five children.

Lisa Goldstein, BFA, LM, RN, CPM, CNM, has been attending homebirths since 1958. Her three sons were born at home. She has lived in the western North Carolina mountains for 25 years and in 1983 became North Carolina's only legal non-nurse midwife. In 1998 she became a CNM and also received certification as a CPM through NARM. She attends births at home, the birth apartment and the hospital. She also makes and sells herbal and homeopathic remedies.

Gail Hart graduated from a midwifery training program as a Certified Professional Midwife in 1977. She was certified by the Oregon Midwives Council and licensed in 1995. She has a small midwifery practice. Gail is strongly interested in ways to holistically incorporate evidence-based medical knowledge with traditional midwifery understandings.

Lynn Hughes, Midwifery Education Program Director for Seattle Midwifery School, has directed the program since June 2001. She has been a midwife for over 10 years and has worked in a variety of settings, including Puget Sound Neighborhood Health Centers, a consortium of community health centers where she provided prenatal care, client education and coordinated maternity care services for a culturally diverse clientele. Her strong academic skills and interest in the scientific literature concerning birth also led her to work with the internationally-recognized author Penny Simkin, with whom she prepared the quarterly index to the current literature for the *Birth* journal and co-authored a pamphlet on obstetric tests and technology.

Polly Malby, CNM completed her midwifery education at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in 1981. She's practiced in a variety of settings including the Falkland Islands, Ohio, Oregon and California. Since 1991, she has taught and practiced at Oregon Health and Science University.

Michel Odent, MD, For several decades Michel Odent has been instrumental in influencing the history of childbirth and health research. As a practitioner he developed

the maternity unit at Pithiviers Hospital in France in the 1960s and '70s. He is familiarly known as the obstetrician who introduced the concept of birthing pools and home-like birthing rooms. His approach has been featured in eminent medical journals such as *Lancet* and in TV documentaries such as the BBC film *Birth Reborn*. With six midwives he was in charge of about one thousand births a year and could achieve ideal statistics with low rates of intervention. After his hospital career he practiced home birth. As a researcher he founded the Primal Health Research Center in London, England, which focuses upon the long term consequences of early experiences. An overview of the Primal Health Research data bank (www.birthworks.org/primalhealth) clearly indicates that health is shaped during the primal period (from conception until the first birthday). Author of approximately 50 scientific papers, Odent has 10 books published in 20 languages to his name. *The Scientification of Love* and *The Farmer and the Obstetrician* raise urgent questions about the future of our civilizations. He is also a contributing editor to *Midwifery Today* magazine and *Having a Baby Today*.

Holly Scholles, CPM, LDM, is the president of Birthingway College of Midwifery in Portland, Oregon. She has been a direct-entry midwife since 1978 and is completing her PhD in Biocultural Anthropology.

Yeshi Sherover Neumann, CNM, MPH, inspired by the homebirth of her first daughter in 1970, began practicing midwifery in a rural community six hours from the nearest hospital. She became a CNM in 1980, so that she could also provide midwifery care to women without the social, educational or financial resources to give birth at home. As a CNM, Yeshi has practiced in many settings—from high-risk obstetrics to working with traditional birth attendants in the mountains of Nicaragua. Currently she has created an innovative homestyle midwifery practice in the hospital. Yeshi has extensive training in counseling, hypnotherapy, meditation, yoga and Rosen Method Body work. Yeshi is the cofounder and Director of The Women's National Leadership Project and the Multicultural Alliance Project.

Maryl Smith, CPM, LM has had a home birth practice since 1984, and also attends births at a freestanding licensed Water Birth Facility. Maryl has been active in legislative work and has served the Oregon Midwifery Council over the years in several capacities. She periodically teaches at Birthingway College of Midwifery. Whenever possible, she sings for midwives and laboring mothers.

Eneyda Spradlin Ramos became interested in birth when she was nine after a midwife solved a prolonged second stage by simply having the mother blow into a bottle three times. Eneyda attended homebirths ten years ago in Okinawa, Japan and is now a third year student at Seattle Midwifery School. She has been a massage therapist for three years, has a BA in human relations, a pilot's license and homeschools her four children, the last two born at home. She was born in Nicaragua and is fluent in Spanish and English.

Marion Toepke McLean, CNM received her nursing degree from Pacific Lutheran College in 1966 and her midwifery degree from Frontier Nursing Service in 1974. She practiced in Eugene, Oregon doing homebirths. Since 1976 she has done home, clinic and hospital births. In 1980, she taught a year-long program for local midwives, while also returning to Frontier Nursing Service to teach during the summer. She had a homebirth practice until 1985, when she went to work at the Nurse-Midwifery Birthing Service, a freestanding birth center. Since July 1998, Marion has done vacation relief as a nurse-midwife and family nurse practitioner. She has worked in three Oregon hospitals and five different clinics. In June 2000, she completed a BA in International Studies at the University of Oregon with concentrated studies on Mexico. She is a contributing editor to *Midwifery Today*.

Jan Tritten is the founder and editor of *Midwifery Today* magazine and *The Birthkit* newsletter. She became a midwife 25 years ago after the wonderful homebirth of her own daughter. Her mission is to make loving midwifery care the norm for birthing women and their babies in this country and around the world.

Naoli Vinaver is a Mexican midwife who combines traditional birth practices with a profound interest and respect toward the physiology and nature of birth. Since 1990, she has attended both waterbirths and births in traditional styles and positions. Naoli has enjoyed three pregnancies and homebirths of her own in the company of her family. She is currently writing and illustrating a children's book on pregnancy and birth while continuing her homebirth practice in both rural and urban Veracruz State, Mexico.

Marsden Wagner, MD, is a neonatologist and perinatal epidemiologist from California and is an outspoken supporter of midwifery. He was responsible for maternal and child health in the European Regional Office of WHO for 14 years. Marsden travels all over the world to talk about appropriate uses of technology in birth and utilizing midwives for the best outcome. His book, *Pursuing the Birth Machine*, is a must for anyone involved in birth.

Mary Zwart is an independent midwife from The Netherlands. She trained to be a midwife at the Amsterdam Midwifery School and graduated in 1969. She received her nursing training at the Leiden Academic Hospital and graduated with honors in 1971. She was a tutor for midwifery at the University of Limburg in 1991. Mary has been practicing midwifery for 27 years and has attended approximately 4,000 births. She is currently a member of the board of the Royal Organization of Dutch Midwives. Her specialty is international midwifery affairs, social and workload problems of Dutch midwives.
